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# PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

## PASS FOR SUCCESS

AEF Pass for Success program offers the opportunity for fifth grade students from the AISD elementary schools to participate in a Football Passing Contest at the Cooper High and Abilene High home football games. The students meeting the distance goal set for the evening will win \$150 for the PE department on their campus, receive an AEF Pass For Success T-shirt, and wear a football jersey from their high school team. Students are selected by their PE coaches and are excited about making a contribution for their school as they show off their passing skills. The huge scoreboard is filled with information about AEF as the announcer introduces the students to the fans and provides information about some of the programs that AEF sponsors. What an exciting evening for AISD students!

## 2ND ANNUAL CAJUN FEST

In April, AEF launched its second annual Cajun Fest event in conjunction with ArtWalk (Sponsored by the Center for Contemporary Arts). With generous support from numerous businesses and individuals, AEF organized a feast of crawfish and shrimp as well as highlighting talented students of AISD. Student performances included AHS Steel Drum Band, CHS Red Rhythm and Blues, Revolution, Dyess Elementary Choir, Cougarette Dance Team, AHS and CHS cheerleaders and K-3rd grade students from all campuses participating in the coloring contest to name the Shrimp Boat. The event proved a huge success and raised \$40,000 in revenue which was used to help support the teachers and students of AISD.

## STAR TEACHER GRANT PROGRAM

The STAR Teacher Grant program (Supporting Teachers with Academic Resources) provides funding to teachers for classroom and instructional projects that enrich curriculum. The grant cycle for STAR Teacher Grants opens in May and is awarded in September. The STAR Teacher Grants are funded by AISD Payroll Deduction Donation Campaign, with matching funds by Kaye Price-Hawkins/Priceless Literacy and The Greathouse Foundation. In addition to payroll deduction contributions, Mike Dudley in honor of his wife Judy, a longtime teacher at Fannin Elementary, gave two STAR grants to two deserving teachers at the new Myra Martinez Elementary. We also received a tremendous outpouring for the Mary Ann Polnick Memorial Fund, a 35 year educator who spent 31 of those years within AISD.

Over the course of the past eight cycles of the STAR Teacher Grant program, AEF has given over \$300,000 in total grants to our deserving and hard-working teachers. Individual grants were awarded for classroom projects, field trips, school equipment, supplies, calculators, games, creative activities and many other items. This past September, 67 community volunteers read and selected 54 different grants from 101 grant applications. Over \$47,000 were awarded to 66 teachers on 17 campuses, which in turn impacts over 10,000 students, more than half of the population of AISD.

The board of the Abilene Education Foundation feels this

program provides one of the most effective avenues for teachers as they strive to meet the diversity of students in their classrooms.



## YOUNG MASTERS JURIED ART EXHIBITION

The Abilene Education Foundation presents the Young Masters Juried Art Exhibition for AISD Advanced Placement Art Students. Held each year in alternating locations at either The Grace Museum or The National Center of Children's Illustrated Literature, this annual exhibition celebrates young master artists and their dedicated teachers for demonstrating excellence in artistic education with a quality museum art exhibition. The Young Masters Exhibition extends the supporting role of AEF with AISD and impacts the future of not only the students selected for the show, but all AP art students by inspiring them to reach their full potential. Additionally, it provides students affirmation that may further enhance opportunities for acceptance into premier higher education art programs.

The exhibition is judged by a professional artist of national recognition. The Best of Show, 1st, 2nd, 3rd Place, three Merit winners, and Honorable Mention winners are announced each year at a reception honoring the student artists and their teachers. College scholarships totaling \$5,000 are awarded annually to the winners.

The Young Masters project is supported by a grant from the "HeArts for the Arts" program of the Abilene Cultural Affairs Council and the City of Abilene. Additional assistance is provided by AISD, Abilene Frame-N-Art Shoppe, and other generous individuals.

## ALUMNI ENDOWMENTS

Alumni Scholarship Funds are endowed monies that provide scholarship opportunities for the graduating seniors of AISD. These scholarship funds are generated by donations from the alumni of the two high

schools in the district. A permanent record of donors and gifts will be maintained by AEF, who will also manage the review of scholarships. The Community Foundation of Abilene will manage the investment of the contributions to the endowment. A \$20,000 endowment has been established for each high school and new donations are added quarterly. This amazing opportunity was begun in 2008 by the AHS class of 1958 and the CHS class of 1978.

## AEF SCHOLARSHIPS

For the second year Abilene Education Foundation was able to give away numerous scholarships. AEF works continuously to raise money for students to make the transition from high school to college as seamless as possible, while working to help those students avoid huge post-graduation debt. Scholarships are also established by community members in honor or memory of loved ones. Last year AEF granted over \$34,000 in scholarships to the students of AISD. Scholarships granted in 2012 include the Abilene Education Foundation Scholarships, AHS and CHS Alumni, Young Masters Juried Art Exhibition Scholarships, Johnny Ortega Jr. Memorial, Judy Trammell-Smith Memorial Art, Heroes Have always Worn Hairnets (School Nutrition Association of Abilene), Abernathy, Meta Alice Keith Bratten, Doug Thompson Memorial Art, and Choose Life Community Scholarship.

Recently, AEF also established an endowment with gifts from an anonymous donor to provide annual scholarship grants. This endowment will be named and awarded to students beginning spring 2014.

## GIFT GRANT PROGRAM

GIFT (Giving to First-time Teachers) Grants help new teachers set up their classrooms at the beginning of each new school year. The average out-of-pocket cost for a new teacher is \$700. Thanks to the generous donations of several Abilene-area retired teachers and community members, AEF was able to provide grants of \$150 each

year to first-year, new-to-the-profession, AISD teachers to help offset some of their classroom expenses.

# WHAT'S NEW WITH AEF?

## C.O.O.L. BECOMES COOLER

In 2007-08 the Shelton Family Foundation generously funded the C.O.O.L. (College Offers Opportunities for Life) Program. Two full-time college advisors were hired (one each at Abilene and Cooper high schools) to assist students who were the first in their families to attend college as well as other students in need of financial aid, college applications, and college visits.

This year, with the help of the Dian Graves Owen Foundation, the C.O.O.L. Program has been able to expand the services offered to AISD students by hiring two additional college advisors. The main goals of the expansion program are:

- Increase the number of seniors who are the first in their families to attend college or economically disadvantaged to apply and enroll in post-secondary institutions.
- Increase awareness of underclassmen and middle school students of the college admission process through classroom presentations.
- Track, locate, and encourage past graduates in the C.O.O.L. Program who have not completed their post-secondary education to re-enroll and finish their degree.

### 2012 C.O.O.L. TEAM



Since inception, the C.O.O.L. Program has served over 1,200 seniors and helped them to enroll in post-secondary education. Beginning this year, a concentrated outreach at ATEMS High School (first graduating class) and Woodson Center for Excellence will be in effect. The C.O.O.L. Program also offers college tours to high school seniors at no cost, FAFSA workshops for parents and students, as well as sponsoring a College Fair which includes all area schools and recruiters from over 60 college campuses. Advisors are Will Medina, ATEMS and Woodson Center for Excellence; Amanda Hothan, Abilene High School; LaQuiera Gantt, Cooper High School; and Christine Curtis-Carr program coordinator/college advisor concentrating in community, post high school graduates, and middle school outreach.

In 2012, additional funding for this program was received from Citi Foundation and NACAC Imagine Fund.

## TEACHERS IN THE LIMELIGHT CELEBRATION (TLC)

The Abilene Education Foundation (AEF) is proud to announce the inaugural Teachers in the Limelight Celebration (TLC) scheduled for Monday, April 29, 2013, at the Abilene Country Club.

This new-to-AEF event is made possible by a generous gift and endowment set up by Mr. Edwin Jennings, Jr., in honor of his parents, Edwin and Agnes Jennings, Sr. The awards banquet is underwritten by Mr. Randy Pool, Abilene Ice, Inc. Mr. Jennings' desire for this event is to recognize, honor, and award monetary gifts to outstanding teachers in Abilene ISD. Late in 2012, each AISD campus nominated a teacher meeting the criteria set forth by Mr. Jennings. Each of these nominees will be honored on their respective campuses, be featured in the news media, and receive a monetary award. One elementary and one secondary teacher will each be awarded an "Edwin and Agnes Jennings Teaching Excellence Award." Because of his passion for teaching math and science, Mr. Jennings also wishes to honor secondary math and secondary science teachers with an "Edwin and Agnes Jennings Teaching Excellence Award."

With the donation of 3,000 shares of ExxonMobile stock from Mr. Edwin Jennings, Jr., a permanent endowment has been established to honor teachers making a difference in the lives of students in Abilene ISD. This endowment will allow AEF to continue these awards yearly for generations to come!

## AEF ACHIEVEMENT GRANT

In 2012, AEF began Achievement Grants for AISD administrators, counselors, or non-profits with programs which directly impact the achievement of AISD students. Grants are awarded quarterly in November, February, May, and August. Funds available per quarter total \$2,500 and are reviewed by a committee of the Abilene Education Foundation. The first Achievement Grants were given in November to the following:

- Woodson Center for Excellence – Rewarding Achievement - \$2,000
- Abilene High School – Partnerships in Learning - \$1,000
- Madison Middle School – Madison ROCKS - \$1,000
- Taylor Elementary School – The Leader in Me - \$1,000
- Young Audiences of Abilene – 7th graders in AISD to attend Amahl and the Night Visitors - \$1,000



# DONOR SPOTLIGHT: MR. EDWIN JENNINGS, JR.

her marriage. Mr. and Mrs. Jennings were active and well-regarded members of the Abilene community.

The Jennings' only child, Edwin J. Jennings, Jr., was born in Abilene in 1922. He attended Alta Vista Elementary, Central School, and graduated from Abilene High School in 1940. He was a member of the Abilene High School Boys Band, winner of the math award, and valedictorian of his class.

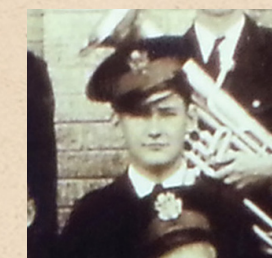
Edwin and Agnes Jennings always emphasized to their son the importance of studying hard and obtaining a college degree. Edwin Jr. still recalls the trip his father took him on to visit Rice Institute in

Houston while he was a senior in high school. Edwin Jr. attended the Rice Institute in Houston and enlisted in the Army Air Corps during WWII. The Army sent him to UCLA where he received a degree in Physics Meteorology. He then became an instructor in that program before being sent to the Philippines where he served until 1946.

Returning to Rice Institute after the war, he received his B.S. in Chemical Engineering in 1948 and an M.S. in Physical Chemistry in 1949. He is a natural-born teacher who tutored many of the younger Rice students in math, chemistry, and physics from 1946-49.

Those students still comment on his remarkable teaching ability. He was hired by legendary coach Jess Neely to be the head tutor for the Rice Institute football team that won the Southwest Conference championship in 1949. Mr. Jennings met Colleen Alessandra at Rice Institute in 1948 and they married in 1949. They live in Houston and have five children who have been awarded a total of nine university degrees.

Edwin J. Jennings, Jr., was born in Abilene in 1922. He attended Alta Vista Elementary, Central School, and graduated from Abilene High School in 1940. He was a member of the Abilene High School Boys Band, winner of the math award, and valedictorian of his class.

**MEMORIALS AND HONORARIUMS PROVIDE STRENGTH FOR AEF PROGRAMS**



*Mary Ann Polnick was a lifetime educator teaching her first three years in Lutheran parochial school, one year with Lubbock ISD, and 31 years in the Abilene Independent School District. She was married to Dr. David Polnick for 38 years and both of their children, Benjie and Julie, graduated from AISD. Mary Ann passed away on February 3, 2012.*

My wife, Mary Ann Polnick, believed in Faith, Family, and Friends and AEF

is an organization that fosters these three concepts by supporting the teachers and children of AISD. Mary Ann believed with her whole heart that every child can learn and everyone in AISD, from a teacher aide, bus driver, cafeteria worker, teacher, principal, and even the superintendent should never forget that we are here for the children. Her passion for faith, family, and friends along with her love for education was very evident.

In the 1990's, Phil Morehead, a former AISD school board member and a local attorney, had an idea that AISD should have its own foundation. He presented his ideas to the administration and the School Board and planted the seed for the formation of our foundation.

**ENDOWMENT FUNDS**

In 2005, Julia Jones Matthews established an endowment benefiting Abilene Education Foundation at Community Foundation of Abilene. The corpus of that endowment is owned and managed by Community Foundation. Interest earned helps with AEF's operational expenses. *JJM: \$519,138*

Abilene Education Foundation has established a second endowment fund also managed by the Community Foundation of Abilene. This endowment, initially established with generous contributions from Lee and Ruth Caldwell, continues to grow and support AEF programs. *AEF Endowment: \$37,699*

In 2009, former Abilene High School and Cooper High School alumni helped to establish the groundwork for two additional endowments to provide scholarships for AHS and CHS graduates. Abilene Education Foundation is working with alumni and AEF

When I became superintendent in 2003, school finance was a major issue. The distribution of funds was not equitable and AISD was at the bottom of funding with no way to increase revenue. Although AEF had only been in existence for a couple of years, their potential for financial assistance to AISD was very evident and it was obvious to me that the foundation needed to grow. The Abilene Education Foundation was a ray of sunshine in our dreary state funding system. One of their first projects was teacher grants and AEF was on their way.

When Mary Ann became ill and I was thinking of ways to honor her life as an educator, memorials to AEF for teacher grants was a no-brainer. I want to say a special thank you to the friends and co-workers of Mary Ann who gave in excess of \$10,000 to honor her life.

I encourage everyone to consider memorials to AEF as a way to honor a loved one who has departed this earth. What a wonderful way to honor the life of anyone who has been involved with the children of AISD. After our Faith, our children are our most valuable resource.
